Teachers' information pack advises children to be briefed prior to visit about appropriate footwear (wellies / walking boots / hard wearing trainers, and long sleeved hard wearing tops and full length trousers.

			Full first aid kit provided, and kept at Baes Camp. All first aiders to know its' location. Cuts and grazes- wounds can be cleaned and plasters applied by first aiders. *Please see note on TETANUS below.
LOW LYING BRANCHES	Injuries to faces / eyes	LOW	Children warned about dangers of low lying branches on entry in to the wood and also during safety brief, and to watch out for these particularly in the LAURELS. Sterile eye Wash Vials available for use at Base Camp if a child gets something in their eye.
FALLING BRANCHES	Injuries	LOW	Woodland monitored at regular intervals through the year by our tree surgeon, and also Kate and Martin Bankes. Dangerous looking dead branches in trees identified and tree surgery work completed prior to visits. Any identified areas after a storm which are deemed unsafe, to be taped off.

			TRIPS TO BE CANCELLED AND REARRANGED IN THE EVENT OF VERY ADVERSE WINDY / WET WEATHER THAST WOULD INCREASE THE RISK OF FALLING BRANCHES. During DEN DISMANTLING, children encouraged to dismantle den from outside layers in (like unwrapping a present or peeling an onion), and making sure no one is inside the den whilst it is being dismantled. First aid kit by Base Camp, and location known by all first aiders.
MOVING BRANCHES eg DEN BUILDING	Injuries	LOW	Children encouraged during safety brief to drag branches around wood, with one hand on one end and the other on the ground. "If it's bigger than you, it's gonna take 2" rule.

WASPS AND BEES	Stings	LOW	Close inspection of the woodland to be regularly carried out for nests. Nests to

be removed where possible, and otherwise taped off and children alerted to their whereabouts during safety brief. Teachers information pack advises prior knowledge of allergies to wasp / bee stings to be obtained, and in addition, prior permission from parents for staff to administer anthisan cream or PIRITON syrup medication in the event of a sting if those are the parents' wishes. IN THE EVENT OF A STING: Children encouraged to tell their supervising adult if they get stung. Adult to immediately remove all children from the area, and report to Kate Bankes immediately. Kate Bankes to then tape off area. First aider to administer cold compress to site of sting, and give medication if parents have given their permission. Cold packs kept at Base Camp. Child's condition then closely monitored by designated adult. Should their condition deteriorate, either contact

			parents / seek further medical assistance – SEE" IN CASE OF EMERGENCY DOCUMENT".

Kate Bankes to warn children about cows, and to advise quiet calm sensible walking and behaviour whilst walking through the field. Party to stay close together. Should cattle come closer, Kate Bankes to move them away.

PRICKLY – THISTLES/ BRAMBLES / HOLLY	Getting prickled.	LOW	Teachers' information pack advises children to be suitably dressed in hard wearing LONG sleeved tops and FULL length trousers, with sturdy footwear. A pair of gardening gloves is useful for certain activities — Kate will advise. First aid Kit at Base Camp, location known by all first aiders.
STINGING (Nettles)	Stings	LOW	Children warned to keep away from nettles.

POISONOUS – HOG WEED, VARIOUS BERRIED PLANTS/	Skin burns from hog weed / severe stomach upsets.	LOW	In the event of a nettle sting, anthisan cream can be administered if parental permission has been given. Children warned in initial safety brief of no picking anything (NO PICK NO LICK)/ and keeping hands away from faces.
MUSHROOMS AND FUNGI/			Regular handwashing throughout day, especially before snack time and lunch time. Areas of Giant Hogweed near paths removed.
FIRE			
SITTING AT BASE CAMP	BURNS	LOW	Fire to be contained within a log bound Fire pit. Fire lit before children arrive in the woods. Fire lighting equipment secure and out of the way in sealed box. Children to be sitting at least 2m away from fire pit on solid wooden tree trunk seats. Children asked to keep bags and possessions outside of the circle behind them so no trip hazards.

			Safe ways of arriving at and leaving circle discussed with children during safety brief. Safe behaviour at base camp also discussed. Water / Fire blanket / first aid kit all located at Base camp within easy reach.
COOKING	BURNS FROM FIRE / HOT FOOD	LOW	Fire maintained at a suitable size for cooking safely on. Fire lit and carefully positioned at start of day so that children do not need to lean too far in to the fire pit to reach fire for cooking. Demonstration of safe cooking given by Kate Bankes before cooking commences on knees, up wind of smoke, what to do if food catches on fire, how to cool food down before eating it). Small groups, a team at a time, asked to come to the fire pit. Cooking supervised closely by Kate and adult linked to team. Childrens' movement to and from the fire as teams rotate is closely monitored and controlled.

			Long hair must be tied back. Dangling scarves / other items of clothing must be removed. Cling film part of First aid Kit for any burns. First aid Kit at Base Camp and location known by all first aiders.

• Tetanus a serious but rare condition caused by bacteria, Clostridium tetani, getting in to a wound. The bacteria live in soil, saliva, dust and manure. It is possible that the children might be exposed to it during any activity outdoors. A tetanus vaccination is given by the NHS as part of the childhood vaccination programme so most children will be covered. However, if parents have opted out of the standard childhood vaccinations for any reason, then these children would not be protected from infection. Please inform Kate of any child that has not had standard vaccinations.
